

# CONGRESS MUST PASS ADDITIONAL LEGISLATION TO FUND STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AND PROVIDE LIABILITY PROTECTION TO RESPONSIBLE ORGANIZATIONS

Dear Members of New York's Congressional Delegation:

The undersigned organizations, which collectively represent a comprehensive array of statewide interests across the business, labor and nonprofit sectors, call upon our federal representatives to pass additional and immediate stimulus legislation to provide full funding to state and local governments in response to the financial devastation caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, Congress must act to protect organizations that are taking State and Federal recommended steps to follow health and safety guidelines for protecting customers and workers.

#### **Financial Support for State and Local Governments**

New York has been the hardest to be hit by COVID-19 and New York s businesses, nonprofits and workers have stepped up. They have endured unprecedented restrictions by closing their doors to patrons and self-quarantining while revenues and wages hemorrhage. As a result of these sacrifices, New York has gone from the global epicenter of the pandemic to a study in shared civil responsibility. In the process, we have taken the biggest economic hit and digested the greatest personal toll in the United States.

In April, the bipartisan National Governors Association estimated that at least \$500 billion in direct federal aid to state and local governments was necessary simply to replace lost revenue necessary to provide basic services. The ensuing two months have brought further financial disruption. As a result, much more is required.

This is not a bail out for prior financial indiscretions or self-inflicted budget wounds. Rather, it is critical support to replace lost receipts and to absorb additional expenditures directly tied to the pandemic a sudden and insidious disease that has taken an outsized toll on New York and for which New Yorkers continue to pay an enormous price. Every source of revenue at the state and local level is affected just as the costs of healthcare, emergency response, and unemployment claims are facing an historic surge.

If you do not act to pass legislation, critical programs and services will be slashed by 20 to 30 percent. That means cuts to schools, Medicaid, aid to municipalities, property tax relief for homeowners, childcare, colleges and universities, agricultural support, environmental programs, aid to seniors, and veterans programs, among others Unemployment, which has more than tripled statewide to 15 percent, will continue to increase as our public workforce will be axed, shuttered small businesses will not re-open and new developments will grind to a halt. The already challenging road to economic recovery will be needlessly extended and severely compromised.



Liability Protection for Responsible Organizations As New York begins to reopen its economy, organizations are faced with unprecedented legal uncertainty and liability risk. Even organizations taking responsible efforts to comply with constantly evolving health-based guidance will find themselves in legal jeopardy. Industries as diverse as health care, higher education, hospitality, food services, retail, real estate, and construction should not be forced to face COVID-19 related litigation from clients they serve or employees in addition to the financial challenges created by the pandemic.

Congress must act to provide organizations and employers with targeted, temporary and limited safe harbors for health-related claims filed during and in the wake of the pandemic. Liability protection should apply only where widely accepted health-based guidelines specific to operations are followed. Reckless acts and omissions and acts of bad faith deserve no protection. Targeted liability protection will create legal certainty for employers, employees, and patrons alike, will prevent a hodgepodge of inconsistent legal interpretations and waiver requirements, and will help accelerate New York s economic recovery.

The time to act is now and we are looking to your leadership to stand strong for New York.
